An Attitude of Gratitude: Building and Sustaining Relationships in the School Community

hank you! Thank you! Thank you! Effective Catholic school leaders model and practice an "attitude of gratitude."

Most principals recognize that effective schools require an extensive network of skilled leaders and volunteers to support the mission and vision of our Catholic schools. Teachers, staff members, pastors, board members, parishioners, and community members are vital to the success and advancement of our Catholic schools. We must not take their support for granted. Let's remember to show appreciation and say thank you!

Depending on the situation, determine if a private or public thank you is more appropriate. For a private thank you, keep a stockpile of thank you notes and prayer cards in your office. As a principal, I suggest routinely writing thank you notes and keeping a list of people who received a card. Public expressions of thanks can be announced to the student body over the public address system or during a general assembly. In addition, a public thank you can be accompanied by flowers, planters, or ceramic angels, when honoring outgoing teachers, staff members, and board members. For example, during an all-school liturgy, the principal can invite outgoing staff members and students to stand, then lead a blessing for them.

To show appreciation to parents, I suggest calling each family at least once during the school year. The point of the conversation is to listen and to thank the parents for sending their children to your school. Also, inquire about the children's attitude and feelings about



school and ask how their children's year is progressing academically. During the conversation, assure parents that you are accessible should they have any further questions, concerns, or ideas. For Catholic Schools Week in January, each family should receive a thank you note from the principal. These simple notes can be printed and signed by the principal.

Our thoughtfulness and appreciation of others yields tremendous dividends in building and sustaining relationships in our Catholic school community.

Now is the time to create a plan for the upcoming school year. What is your plan to appreciate and thank valued Catholic school community members?

Administrators' Pathway for an Attitude of Gratitude

 Call parents at least once during the school year. The point of the conversation is to listen, inquire about their children, and ask how the school year is progressing. Thank parents for sending their children to the school.

- 2. Assure parents that you are accessible for any conversations or to answer any questions on the phone, via email, or in person.
- 3. Ensure that each parent receives a thank you note from you during Catholic Schools Week.
- 4. Write thank you notes regularly, keeping a list of the recipients.
- 5. Deliver a helium-filled birthday balloon (and a thank you) to students, teachers, and staff members on their special day. (Note any students or staff members with latex allergies and offer another simple gift of appreciation.)
- 6. Write thank you notes to parent volunteers.
- Practice an attitude of gratitude by verbally thanking students, colleagues, pastors, parents, and community members.
- 8. Treat staff members to a sundae bar, a simple breakfast or coffee bar.
- 9. Establish a public thank you tradition for outgoing teachers, staff members, and board members. Pray a blessing for them.
- Recognize students who will be leaving the school at the last school Mass. Invite these students to stand and pray a blessing for them.

Live Streaming God in Your Classroom This School Year

he beginning of the school year is such an exciting time to plan and prepare for all of the things we want to accomplish with and for our students. As you set up your classroom and plot your scope and sequence, have you taken some time to think about how you will plan for being a spiritual leader this year? We have all heard the adage, "You can't give what you don't have." Sometimes the excitement, the content, the workload or the pace of the school year can leave us feeling burnt out. Planning some time for yourself to develop spiritually can keep you refreshed and relaxed as those busy times seem to take over. Regardless of your grade level or topic area, try embedding some spiritual habits into your school day. This will help you make it a priority as well as be a true witness to your students to see how faith is the source of all that you are doing.

Create Sacred Space Your Classroom:

Designate a corner or table where you display items that connect you and your students to the faith. It can be a Bible, statues, prayer cards, candles...anything you find inspirational. Plan how you will change the space throughout the liturgical year. Invite students to help manage and use the space as well.

Pray With Your Students: Hopefully, prayer is already part of your daily schedule in some way, but consider providing a safe place where students can offer their intentions to their classmates. It is an authentic way to listen to the concerns on their hearts and learn what is happening with their personal lives. Be sure to let them pray for you as well. Letting them know what is on your



heart and mind not only gives them an example of prayer, but praying together builds a relationship that strengthens their concept of what it means to be in a faith community.

Pray Without Your Students: Yes, prayer with students is wonderful, but when you are in charge, sometimes it is difficult to be fully present to God when you are trying to be fully present to 30 students. If building the habit of prayer is difficult, put a reminder in your phone or calendar. Pick a time of day during your planning period or before or after school to sit with scripture, read about the saint of the day or just sit quietly and journal.

Invite God In: We all know about "teachable moments," so look for everyday moments where you can see God or feel His Holy Spirit. Point them

out to students and even colleagues and parents. If something amazing happened in class, talk about how God played a role in it as you debrief. If you have a difficult moment, invite Him in to help mitigate the conversation and guide you.

While many of these suggestions are not new ideas, hopefully they provide some practical ways to intentionally include prayer in your day. The ministry of teaching is a humbling gift but it is not always easy. Having a plan for keeping spirituality present and making it a habit to keep you accountable and provide a beautiful witness to your students and colleagues and may just help you stave off teacher burnout this year.

Visions for Excellence Early Childhood Education Conference debuts as part of NCEA 2019 Convention & Expo

arly childhood educators can begin making plans to attend the 2019 NCEA Visions for Excellence Early Childhood Education (ECE) Conference which will take place on a designated day during the NCEA 2019 Convention & Expo in Chicago April 23-25. Attendees will have the benefit of not only attending a specialized conference and networking with those who share a passion for ECE, but will also be able to take advantage of convention sessions on the non-ECE conference days, enjoy convention liturgies, attend special events and visit the exhibit hall.

Early childhood education programs are an integral part of Catholic schools across the country. Results in the United States Catholic Elementary and Secondary Schools 2017-2018: The Annual Statistical Report on Schools, Enrollment and Staffing report, show that 171,421 students or 13.2 % of students enrolled in Catholic elementary schools are in preschool. This number represents preschool programs that are part of the Catholic school or a separate center that provides an educational program under the control of the school (some are PK3 and some are PK4). The data indicates this is the largest grade level for elementary schools, up from 152,980 in 2007-2008 reflecting 12% growth. Additionally, the percent of overall elementary school enrollment represented by preschool students was up from 9.3% in 2007-2008 and 10.9% in 2012-2013. When considering all



grade levels, preschool to grade 8, preschool is the only group showing enrollment growth between 2007-2008 and 2017-2018.

A look at the *United States Catholic Elementary and Secondary Schools 1996-97: The Annual Statistical Reports on Schools, Enrollment and Staffing* report shows preschool enrollment of 67,637 students for 1987-1988 representing 3.4% of the students enrolled in Catholic elementary schools. In the 30-year period between 1987-1988 and 2017-2018, preschool enrollment has increased by 153%. In comparing the 1987-1988 and 2017-2018 data, all other elementary grades reflect a decline in enrollment.

Based on the data, Catholic school

educators have a great opportunity to capitalize on the trend of increasing preschool enrollment and develop strategies to retain those students as they matriculate into kindergarten.

When planning how to attract and retain preschool students, there are many factors to consider. One of the top priorities is defining what constitutes a quality ECE program and then implementing the supports and structures needed to ensure a quality program. There are a number of sources for working through this process.

First, let us consider the priorities of those we serve. Results from a recent national market research study conducted by the National Catholic

Educational Association (NCEA) and Foundations and Donors Interested in Catholic Activities (FADICA) indicate that today's parents are savvy, informed customers who want to ensure their children are well positioned for a successful future. As such, it is critical that high quality programming is on the forefront. The more parents believe that the school offers a balance between academics and religious teachings, an environment where everyone is welcome and places an emphasis on character development, the more likely they are to consider a Catholic school for their children.

Catholic ECE programs are uniquely positioned to respond to the priorities of current and potential Catholic school parents. Imbued in the faith, ECE programs nurture the faith life of the students and Catholic virtues provide a strong foundation for character development. Catholic schools have long had a reputation for excellence in academics and must share their success as part of the overall effort to retain current families and

attract new ones.

operate." Those whose passion is early childhood education will benefit from the defining characteristics and performance benchmarks of Catholic schools outlined within the NSBECS.

Finally, many early childhood educators are familiar with the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) Early Learning Program Standards. These standards, found on the NAEYC website, identify key areas of best practices for ensuring a quality ECE program. While there is some overlap between the NSBECS and the NAEYC standards, early childhood educators will benefit from guidance

on developmentally appropriate practice (DAP) for early learners.

As Catholic school educators look to the future, they can be heartened by the growing number of students enrolling in ECE programs in Catholic schools across the country. In times of declining enrollment,

this is a bright spot. Let us all work together to identify strategies to maximize the enrollment of these students by retaining them beyond the preschool years and identify strategies to continue to grow this population of students. What better time to begin the conversation than at the 2019 NCEA Visions for Excellence Early Childhood Education Conference taking place during the NCEA 2019 Convention & Expo in Chicago in April. We hope to see you there!





10 Things to Remember When Selecting Marketing Photos

ne of the challenges of marketing is the limited amount of time in which one has to convey a message. Social media and the 24-hour news cycle competes for an audience's attention. When it comes to school marketing, people do not have or take the time to diligently read through a school's mission statement and course catalogue. As the assistant superintendent of enrollment and marketing, I use a lot of pictures. I tweet them and print them as well as create slide presentations and videos. A great picture can share your message more strongly and quickly than can words.

Since I work to promote Catholic education, I want to show the joy present in our schools. Joy in academics, faith and community. Easy right? No. Schools

just didn't have those high resolution pictures available, which are important for using and printing photos in a variety of mediums. In a time when nearly everyone has a camera via cell phone in their pocket, I hired a professional photographer and together we went to our first school.

Well, after five years and thousands of pictures I learned a few things and would like to share them with you.

- Choose a photographer with whom you have a good working relationship.
- Choose students ahead of time and make sure you have their parents' written permission on file.
- Have a plan. Make your list of musthaves: principal, pastor, pastor with students, children running, teacher

- with student and technology, etc. Science labs take time to set up and pastors need to get the date on their calendars.
- Good lighting is everything. Morning light is best. We take all our outdoor shots (pastor, principal, playground, First Communion, students walking and talking) first.
- 5. Plan your event in the beginning of the year when uniforms are crisp and new. Use the most formal version if possible. I happen to love late September in Virginia when the leaves are just about to turn.
- Details matter. Watch out for pesky items like nail polish, rubber bands around wrists, untied uniform shoes, sun darkening eyeglasses and background items like moving vans and recycling bins.
- 7. Don't be afraid to stage shots such as First Communion, Confirmation and graduation. You only need a few students to convey that event. Parents are happy to help out with this. Keep those outside.
- 8. Wear comfortable shoes. You'll do a lot of running back and forth, making kids laugh and sometimes having to jump up and down to get that giggle or smile.
- 9. These are marketing, not yearbook photos. Do not mix the two. Great marketing photos should be timeless. Utilizing a professional photographer who can take polished photos that may be used year after year is a great investment.
- 10. Be flexible. Sometimes the best photos are the images you didn't plan!

Many Gifts, One Nation A Day of Giving to Catholic Schools

Some FAQs to help you get started!

When is Many Gifts, One Nation?

Tuesday, January 29, 2019 12 PM EST – Wednesday, January 30, 2019 12 PM EST

Many Gifts, One Nation occurs during National Catholic Schools Week in conjunction with the daily themes of celebrating students and celebrating the nation.

Can we participate another day?

Our school/diocese already has a day of giving, can we only do one or the other?

The day of giving platform will only be available to accept gifts during the times listed above.

If your school chooses to opt-out of Many Gifts, One Nation, we encourage you to still consider building your advancements efforts. Some schools and dioceses already have their own day of giving such as #iGiveCatholic on Giving Tuesday – which is great! Many Gifts, One Nation is meant to supplement these efforts. Many Gifts, One Nation may connect new or unexpected donors to your school. Donors have the option to search for schools by name or location; if your school opts out, it will not be listed. You are welcome to use the tools and templates offered to help you in your existing advancement efforts as you wish.

Why should my school/ diocese participate?

Many Gifts, One Nation is a national campaign focused on giving back locally, similar to Giving Tuesday or Small Business Saturday. Donors will connect directly with your school. This can create long-term, mutually beneficial relationships for your school and potential supporters. Schools will generate increased exposure within their own communities. Many Gifts, One Nation allows everyone who has been impacted by Catholic schools to join together and give back.

When can we update our individual giving page?

83% of schools that received gifts on the day of giving customized their giving pages. The customization period will open in fall 2018. NCEA will notify all schools when the portal opens. Principals are the primary administrator and must add additional administrators to make updates to the page. To ensure your school can be among the first to update their giving page, please make sure your advancement/development, marketing, communications, admissions and business office personnel are added to our database. Visit www.NCEA. org/csw/manygifts to submit contact information for your Many Gifts, One Nation project leads.

How soon after the day of giving ends will our school receive our gifts?

The Many Gifts, One Nation giving portal will close at 12 PM on Wednesday, January 30, 2019. All gifts are held for 60-75 days to ensure there are no chargebacks or bank discrepancies. After that time, the funds will be released to schools in the form of a single check.

Are there fees to participate?

There is no participation fee for any school. Many Gifts, One Nation is available to any and all Catholic school serving from early education through 12th grade.

There are standard credit card processing fees and transaction fees withheld from donations, along with a single shipping/handling fee for physical checks that will be mailed. Visit www. NCEA.org/csw/manygifts for more information.

How should we go about setting our dollar and donor goals?

Giving days are structured to encourage any individual to give what they can and leverage their gift by giving at the same time as others. In addition, Many Gifts, One Nation also focuses on individual giving – encouraging increased donors versus size of dollars. Identify your

school's financial needs and set a goal that is attainable but not unrealistic. Keep in mind you can change your goal amount throughout the day of giving. If you meet your goal, you can bump it up later in the day.

How do we encourage people to give online?

A recent worldwide study by NGO Technology Report showed that 72% of millennials, 66% of Gen. X and 54% of baby boomers prefer to make their donations online. Giving days, like Many Gifts, One Nation, are attractive to a broad range of donors due to accessibility and excitement.

Last year some schools anticipated donors who were apprehensive to give online and set up "giving stations." By setting up computers on campus and extending an invitation to donors to make their gift on-site, schools secured gifts and also had the opportunity to give school tours to those who had not visited in recent years!

Who has access to our donor information?


Your school is the only organization with access to your donor information. NCEA does not have access to your donor reports and cannot send information directly to your donors. All schools have access to their donor reports in the three months following the day of giving to send thank you notes and tax acknowledgments.

How can I opt-out?

Participation is optional. Schools may opt-out at any time by visiting www.NCEA. org/csw/manygifts. Please note there is no obligation to participate. However, if a school opts-out and a donor seeks to give to the school and finds it unlisted, that is a lost donor opportunity.

No. All Catholic schools, regardless of their member affiliation with NCEA, are included.


Do you have to be a FACTS customer to participate?

Are there restrictions on how we can use the gifts?

Unless a donor restricts the gift for a specific purpose, Catholic schools and dioceses are encouraged to put the gift toward the area of greatest need.

Schools are encouraged to make a "cause statement" on their giving page, sharing what you need and how you will use funds.
